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

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



Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence

The **Antonia Brancia Maxon Award for EHDI Excellence** honors the career achievements of Dr. Antonia Brancia Maxon in promoting effective EHDI programs for all newborns, infants, and young children. Dr. Maxon was a visionary in EHDI programs, beginning with her leadership in the Rhode Island Hearing Assessment Project in the late 1980's. She was one of the first to recognize the feasibility and value of universal newborn hearing screening and was a tireless advocate for connecting screening programs with timely and appropriate diagnosis and early intervention.

Her extensive contributions to creating excellent EHDI programs were abruptly ended by a tragic automobile accident in May of 2007. In memory of her contributions, an **Award for EHDI Excellence** is presented at the EHDI Annual Meeting to honor an individual or group of people who have made a noteworthy accomplishment that contributed to achieving excellence in EHDI programs nationally or in a particular state or region of the country.

HRSA's Vision for Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) Programs

The Maternal and Child Health Bureau of the Health Resources and Services Administration was an early proponent of universal newborn hearing screening beginning with their funding of the Rhode Island Hearing Assessment Program in the 1980's. Since that time MCHB has provided continuous funding and support to reduce loss to follow-up, connect newborn hearing screening programs to the medial home, use quality improvement methods, and engage families. Future directions and initiatives to continually improve Early Hearing Detection and Intervention (EHDI) systems will be discussed with suggestions for how various stakeholders can collaborate.



Dr. Michael Warren

Dr. Michael Warren became Associate Administrator of the Maternal and Child Health Bureau (MCHB), part of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services' Health Resources and Services Administration, on October 15, 2018. MCHB's mission is to improve the health of America's mothers, children, and families. Its Title V Maternal and Child Health Block Grant Program provides health care and public health services for an estimated 56 million people, including pregnant women, infants,

children, including children with special health care needs, and their families in the United States.

Dr. Warren manages MCHB's \$1.33 billion budget, providing vision and direction to ensure programs are planned and carried out effectively to achieve results. Dr. Warren's impressive career in public health clearly demonstrates his passion and commitment to improving maternal and child health outcomes.

Before assuming his current role, Dr. Warren served as the Deputy Commissioner for Population Health at the Tennessee Department of Health. In this role, he made improvements in maternal and child health across the state in the areas of safe sleep policies, breast feeding rates, decreased early elective deliveries, newborn screening transit times, electronic systems for WIC and vital records registration, and establishing the first-ever real-time public health surveillance system for neonatal abstinence syndrome

As a board-certified pediatrician, Dr. Warren previously served as the Tennessee Department of Health Assistant Commissioner for Family Health and Wellness and as the Director of Maternal and Child Health. Prior to joining the Department of Health, he served as an Assistant Professor in the Department of Pediatrics at Vanderbilt and as Medical Director in the Governor's Office of Children's Care Coordination.

Dr. Warren graduated Summa Cum Laude with Honors in Psychology from Wake Forest University and earned his medical degree from the Brody School of Medicine at East Carolina University, where he was inducted into the Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Medical Society. He completed his pediatrics residency, Chief Residency, and fellowship in Academic General Pediatrics at Vanderbilt, where he also obtained a Master's in Public Health. He is a fellow of the American Academy of Pediatrics.

Dr. Warren has served as President for the Association of Maternal and Child Health Programs (AMCHP), the national professional organization for maternal and child health professionals. He was also appointed by the United States Department of Health and Human Services to the Secretary's Advisory Committee on Infant Mortality (SACIM).

Survive and Thrive


We are all expected to be on the top of our game and take on the challenges that life presents to us, but managing them can be difficult. We are all too familiar with the stresses in life and the damage it can do to the biology and the psyche of a person. Resilience, solutionoriented thinking, positive attitude and decision-making with a strong dose of purpose is the foundation for mental fitness. That doesn't mean that things don't go wrong as they often do in life, but just surviving is not enough. It is also about thriving.



Eric Hipple

Eric Hipple is a former National Football League (NFL) quarterback whose ten year career was spent with the Detroit Lions. Hipple's accomplishments include two playoff bids, a divisional championship, and the Detroit Lion's Most Valuable Player award for the '81 season. From 1995-2000 Hipple was color analyst for the FOX NFL pre-game show in Detroit. Since his 15-year-old son Jeff's suicide, Hipple has devoted his life to building awareness and breaking down the stigma surrounding depressive illnesses. Hipple recently received an Honorary Doctorate for his work in Mental Health from Utah State University, his Alma Mater, the University of Michigan 2015 Nuebacher Award for work with stigma associated with disabilities, the Detroit Lions 2010 Courage House award, and the prestigious 2008 Life Saver Achievement award

given by the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention. He co-authored a study examining depression among retired football players that appeared in the April 2007 issue of Medicine & Science in Sports & Exercise. He was awarded a presidential citation at the American Psychological Association's 2006 Annual Convention for his six years of national community-based work combating adolescent depression and suicide prevention. His message of resilience has provided mental fitness awareness to professional groups, military, law enforcement, schools, communities and through the "Under the Helmet" program, thousands of high school and youth coaches across the country. In conjunction with NAVY U.S. Fleet Forces, he has provided workshops on suicide and destructive behavior prevention during the last 10 years by focusing on Mental Fitness. His book "Real Men Do Cry" received a publisher Presidential Award. After retiring from University of Michigan's Comprehensive Depression Center, where he spent eleven years in outreach, Hipple is currently working to provide mental health awareness among military veterans, youth and in the workplace. Eric's commitment to helping others find a quality in life is demonstrated through his work with several nonprofits: After the Impact Fund, Center Neurological Studies, SPESA, and BeNice (a school based education program sponsored by the Mental Illness Resource Association.

Putting Ourselves into the Story: Promoting Resilience for Children Who are DHH and their Families

What would happen if we enter radical relationships, pursue relentless collaborations, commit to dismantling harmful systems and structures, and envision an equitable future for all children who are deaf/hard of hearing (DHH) irrespective of race, family income, place of residence, language, gender, or social status? Examining the outcomes of the most vulnerable among us, we can see that our intervention systems have a long way to go to meet the needs of all children and families in our care. Yet, as early hearing detection and intervention (EHDI) stakeholders we must remain hopeful and committed to the individual and systems change required to achieve a future where all children and families can achieve their full potential.

This presentation will describe and define sources of adversity and the subsequent impact on child development. The Adverse Childhood Experiences Survey will be presented to appraise those sources of adversity and trauma which impact the children and families encountering EHDI systems. The impact of sustained early adversity on children and families will be examined through both neuro-developmental and family-systems approaches. Resources to aid in individual and systems change will be offered, including opportunities to identify one's own bias, build authentic relationships, assess family-needs, provide short-and long-term resources, advocate, and promote the highest educational outcomes. EHDI participants will be called up on to name opportunities they have to influence family resilience and build organizational capacity within their own spheres of influence. After considering the systems designed to support learners who are DHH, participants are challenged to consider how child and family adversity is attended to, or not, in their own service delivery models.


How might we engage in honest self-reflection and open dialogue with one another, so we can create more equitable EHDI systems of support for children who are DHH and their families?



Jenna Voss Fontbonne University

Jenna Voss, PhD, CED, LSLS Cert AVEd, is an Assistant Professor and Director of Deaf Education in the Communication Sciences and Disorders & Deaf Education program at

Fontbonne University. She received her undergraduate degree in Deaf Education, and her master's degree in Early Intervention in Deaf Education from Fontbonne University. As a National Leadership Consortium in Sensory Disabilities (NLCSD) fellow, she completed her PhD in Speech and Hearing Sciences in the Program in Audiology and Communication Sciences at Washington University in St. Louis. She holds teaching certification in the state of Missouri in the areas of Deaf Education and Early Childhood Special Education. Her background, as a educator of the deaf and early intervention provider, has informed research interests including promoting resilience for children and families experiencing adversity, provider use of strategies and techniques implemented in family-centered practice, and interprofessional preparation of pre-service listening and spoken language (LSL) practitioners.





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
